Othniel: prototype judge

- 3:7-11
 - Recapitulation of the downward spiral
 - Downward spiral applied to a specific context (Othniel)

- Othniel gets it right (not flawed)
 - He has the right pedigree
 - He follows Yahweh's commands
 - He is a good example

- The Othniel story serves as a prototype for comparison with the other judges
 - Deviations from this prototype become important for interpretation

Foreign god worship

Baal (canaanite god)

- Description
 - Owned and controlled the land
 - Responsible for fruitfulness of the land and fertility
 - Crops, cattle, fruit trees
 - Worked through appeasement and manipulation
- Worship rituals
 - Incense, sacrifices, fertility rights (Asherah)
 - Prostitution and human sacrifice
- Israel moved from being nomadic to agrarian

Ehud: the cripple who delivers

- Ehud the Benjaminite “son of the right hand”
 - Can Ehud deliver?
- Eglon “calf”
 - A very fat man who is clueless

- Brutality, treachery, and cunning
 - Hidden sword
 - Dabar - means “word” or “thing”
 - Assassination
- Idol worship (pesilim)
 - Ehud turns back at the sculptured stones 3:19
- Unity
 - Ehud rallies Israel to fight against Moab and subdues them 3:27-28

Practical Application

- Disability doesn't disqualify you
 - God will use you in your weakness to show His strength
 - It is God who is at work in you to bring about His will
- Foreign kings are useless, so why do you want one?
 - 2020 election, were you disappointed? Why? What was your hope set in?
 - Foreign kings rise and fall at the hand of God, so why do you want one?

- Do you trust God?
- We can't help but seek concrete security in things we can control

What we learned

- Deviations from the prototype become important for interpretation
 - Think, "how does this judge compare to Othniel?"
- Worship of foreign gods is highly seductive
 - Baal fertility worship
- Foreign kings are incapable compared to Yahweh
 - We can't help but seek concrete security in things we can control
